### **Special Provisions**

1. Phil prerequisites must be completed before taking PHIL courses beyond introductory level
2. Check the prerequisites for the courses you want to enroll. Courses above PHIL 10 require 1 intro PHIL course, and any PHIL 50 requires 2 previous philosophy courses.
3. Students should be aware that transfer credits may not qualify for the modified majors (transfer credits for courses in the Economics Department are *never* accepted for the Government Modified With Economics major). Students considering using transfer credits for *any* of the modified majors must contact the Government department to verify that the course will be accepted.
4. Every year, we revise and update the information available in this study form. Sometimes the departments make changes between the revisions. Please check the government and philosophy departments' websites for updated information.
